Occupation: A dermatologist at the Mayo Clinic.

Home base: A century-old house in Rochester, furnished with vintage pieces and reproductions he's acquired over the years, and decorated with watercolor landscapes painted by his artist grandfather.

Urban getaway: A three-story down-town Minneapolis condo built in "modern brownstone" style.

The appeal: "I grew up in Dublin, and I love being in the city," Davis said. "I wanted a place to have people over. I do more entertaining here [in Minneapolis]."

Style statement: "My house in Rochester is quite traditional," Davis said. "When I got the place in Minneapolis, I wanted it sleek and contemporary, as a contrast to that."

How he got the look: "I don't know anything about design whatsoever. I have an interior designer friend, and he offered to help. I turned him loose." Davis didn't have a big budget, he said, so his friend advised him to invest in a few good pieces, then augment with inexpensive pieces from Target, Home Goods and Ikea.

The way he lives: "My Rochester house feels like a place for relaxing. I tend to spend a lot of time in the kitchen," he said. "In Minneapolis, I feel like I'm on vacation. All of the city is on my doorstep, and I go out a lot more. I enjoy meeting friends, going to plays and restaurants."
